# Cecil Hotel: Elisa Lam's disappearance

Elisa Lam's disappearance was reported on February 1, 2013. This transpired in the Cecil Hotel in downtown LA. This hotel has an outburst of different cases happening throughout the decades. Why was the Elisa Lam case so significant? What were the circumstances leading up to her disappearance? How was this case closed, and why does it remain unsolved?

The Cecil Hotel was constructed in 1924; it was built as a destination for business travelers and tourists. It took about \$1.5 Million to build. Not even five years passed when the U.S hit rock bottom at the beginning of the great depression. The hotel had flourished as a very fashionable and trendy place through the 1940s; it heavily declined at the times of the great depression. During the great depression, an area known as skid row began to develop and increase in population. Skid Row has become one of the most prominent stable places in the United States (approx varying from 4,200–8,000 residents). It is famous for its condensed homeless population since the nineteen-thirties. It is one of the most critical districts in Los Angeles, with a long history of police arrests, city-targeted programs, and homelessness. The Cecil hotels' reports based on separate incidents increased during these decades, from the reported Suicide of Percy Ormond Cook. He committed suicide on January 22, 1927, the murder of "Pigeon Goldie" Osgood on June 4, 1964.

To the famous murderer in the 1980s, Richard Ramirez, otherwise known as The Nightstalker. Upon those tragedies comes Elisa Lam's case.

Elisa Lam was an immigrant from Hong Kong. She was a student at the University of British Columbia. She decided to take a vacation. arriving at San Diego and visiting spots, such as the zoo. By January 26, she arrived in Los Angeles. Furthermore, by January 28, she had checked into the Cecil Hotel. Lam has been diagnosed with depression and bipolar disorder. To cure her illnesses, she was prescribed four medications: Wellbutrin, Lamictal, Seroquel, and Effexor. According to her relatives, Lam had no history of suicidal ideations or attempts, who allegedly kept her mental illness a secret. However, one source suggested she had previously gone missing for a brief time.

Lam kept in touch with her parents in British Columbia every day while on the road. Her parents did not hear from her on February 1. 2013, the day she was supposed to check out of the Cecil and leave for Santa Cruz, and they contacted the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD); her family flew to Los Angeles to assist with the search. The police investigated the hotel to the degree that they were legally permitted to do so. They searched Lam's room and had dogs search the entire hotel, including the rooftop, but the dogs were unable to locate her." But we did not search every room," Sgt. Rudy Lopez later explained, "because we could only do that if we had probable cause."

The LAPD agreed that further assistance was needed on February 6, a week after Lam was last seen. Flyers with her picture were distributed in the community and on the internet. It used the media to bring the event to the public's attention. On February 15, after another week with no sign of Lam. the LAPD released a video of the last known sighting taken in one of Cecil's elevators by a video surveillance camera on February 1. Elisa, alone, makes unusual moves and gestures in an approximate two and a half minute footage, leaving the elevator at one point. Simultaneously, its doors remain open, even after she appears to have pressed every button. When the doors fail to close after she returns, she leaves: the doors close later. Many of the viewers knew this was the last known footage of her being alive. Upon millions of streams of that released footage came allegations and conspiracies to what may have been the cause of her disappearance.



During Lam's search, guests at the hotel began to complain about the low pressure of water. Some subsequently said their water was black with an unusual flavor. On February 19, the hotel maintenance workers Santiago López found Lam's body, housed on a roof with water in the rooms, a bathroom, and a coffee shop in the four tanks, a thousand-gallon body, and 3,785 1. He saw Lam lying face-up in the water through the open hatch.

The tank was drained and opened as its maintenance hatch was too small to contain the necessary equipment to remove Lam's body. On February 21, an adverse drowning finding was issued by the Los Angeles coroner's office, with a significant factor in bipolar disorder. The complete coroner's report, released in June, stated that Lam's body was found naked; her wearing clothes were floating in the water, coated in a "sandy particle," similar to what was in the elevator video. She also found her watch and room key. Physical trauma, sexual assault, or suicide were not demonstrated. Traces of her prescription medication, plus nonprescription drugs such as Sinutab, and ibuprofen, were found in toxicology tests. There was a minimal amount of alcohol but no other recreational drugs (about 0.02 g percent). However, researchers and experts have noted that their prescription drug concentrations in their system have recently revealed that they have been undermedicated or have ceased to take their medications.



Upon her death came various theories; the top 5 theories include suicide, substance abuse, dark water film murder replicated, and supernatural forces that haunted her; which theory could you possibly believe the most?

Suicide: Lam had an active Tumblr blog, and she documented her struggles with depression and anxiety. "I wish that I could put part of my brain in a taped shut box, shoot it for the night at my closet," she wrote in a post. Some online sleuths pointed out that she died of suicide to her posts. However, the coroner said "a comprehensive examination of the circumstances" did not support the idea that Lam, according to CBC, tried to hurt himself. Lam also did not say that she planned her death in the last post about her Tumblr. "I got to Laland... I got to... And next to the place I stay there is a monstrosity of a building," She wrote about the Hotel Cecil. "When I say monstrosity, I say as in Gaudy, but in 1928 the art deco theme was built again, so it is elegant and then, as it is in LA, it went off. Baz Lurhmann is quite sure that this is where Great Gatsby is to be filmed."

Substance abuse: People indicated that she was using hallucinatory drugs by Lam's behavior on the elevator. Nevertheless, Vice reports that her toxicology report found no evidence of drugs or alcohol in her system. This is not a speculation-based theory but facts. Elisa had bipolar disorder, a mental illness caused by depression and mania. Elisa took prescribed antidepressants, antipsychotic products, and mood stabilizers. These drugs should now work in harmony. One can seriously damage one's system if you take without the other. Moreover, that is what Elisa did until her death day. According to the toxicology report. Elisa's antidepressant

but not her psychotic and mood stabilizer were recently taken.

#### Dark water film murder

replicated: Dark Water is a Hollywood rewrote Japanese horror movie in 2005. The ghost they are haunted by is that of a girl who died on the apartment building roof after falling into the water tanks. Was anyone trying the film for kicks before it went too far? Several people asked this question. Moreover, you make a connection instantly if you saw the film as I did some years ago. However, I do not think this theory has much worth, however troubling it might be.

#### Supernatural forces haunted her:

The Hotel Cecil was built in the beginning with a view of pure grandeur and opulence. The owner dreamed of being a busy lounge for good-looking people in business and wealthy people. Nevertheless, the Cecil Hotel became a terrible place where several people were killed in the decades. The hotel was known as a seedy underground paradise for criminals, murderers, and prostitutes. This was actually where the Richard Ramirez 'NightStalker' unwind after women were hunted and killed.

They began to wonder whether Elisa was owned by one of the many people in this "cursed" hotel who had lost their lives. Another popular theory I can remember watching is that Elisa was playing lift games in a Buzzfeed Unsolved video. In this "game," a player presses the buttons for a particular measure. The players say that the entities that followed them after the game haunted them. It was strongly speculated that Elisa interacts with other-dimensional spirits in the CCTV footage, which were not taken on camera.
