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## Eye on Pop Culture: The Nevers

I don't know if I am anybody's idea of a sci-fi nerd. There are, however, a few things that I am a sucker for, and some Victorian steam-punk is one of them.

Victorian steam-punk gives us the entry point into this occasionally muddled but very entertaining HBO limited series. What we know at the start is this: it is 1896 London: a heavily class-based, top-hatted society with rigidity and a miserable underclass with Eliza Doolittle accents. A few people who live in the margins, namely some women, a few people of color, and otherwise shy folks have been "touched" by some unknown force, meaning they have special powers. The powers can range from anything to magically healing any ailment (very cool) to being extremely tall (kind of inconvenient) to seeing snippets of the future without understanding it (annoying).

The elite of society are terrified of the Touched because, as a member of the House of Lords puts it, "God's natural order is being disrupted." Yes, a man in power proclaims that the patriarchy and white supremacy was all God's idea. But now this order has been threatened, and the Touched are in danger.



Got that? Good. Because then it gets weird. There are aliens, maybe, and fears of a serial killer, who is genuine. In Hollywood's serial killer tradition, she is charming. But against these rules, she is, well, a she. The chief antagonist is a woman, as are the two protagonists who run a safe haven for the Touched.

As I said, the plot gets muddled at times, and there are a few characters who probably deserve to get pushed into the Thames River. But overall, the pacing and the production design are well done.

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**A warning:** a few episodes were directed by Joss Whedon, a former wunderkind-turned-exposed creep. Whedon's former work includes Buffy, The Vampire Slayer and Justice League. His TV shows and movies have a whimsically wry tone that has gained him a huge following, but his hideous behavior towards women has landed him in the doghouse. I understand that this might leave many potential viewers unwilling to watch one second of his work. 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## Mental Health Awareness

### Month: MAY

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on people of all ages' mental health. It is more important than ever to reduce the stigma associated with mental health issues, as this stigma often prevents people from seeking help. While one out of every five people will suffer from a mental illness at some point in their lives, everyone faces challenges that can affect their mental health. Overall it is believed that those who suffer from mental illness are categorized as crazy or lunatic. That is false, students, teachers, parents, family, even children are affected by mental illness or under the topics of mental health. Foundations such as the **National Awareness on Mental Illness(.N.A.M.I.)**, will amplify The message of "*You Are Not Alone*". Through their blogs, personal stories, videos, digital toolkits, social media engagements, and national events, they will focus on the healing value of connecting in safe ways, prioritizing mental health, and acknowledging that "it's okay to not be okay."



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The goal of Mental Health Awareness Month is to raise public awareness and educate people about mental illnesses such as depression, schizophrenia, and bipolar disorder, which affect 18.1 percent of Americans, the realities of living with these conditions, and strategies for achieving mental health and wellness. It also aims to raise awareness about suicide, which can be triggered by certain mental illnesses. Furthermore, Mental Health Awareness Month aims to reduce the stigma associated with mental illnesses (negative attitudes and misconceptions). A presidential proclamation established the month. For these and other reasons, it's critical for those with eating disorders to pay attention to their mental health this month (and always), and for those who aren't to join us in raising awareness.

It is critical to recognize Mental illness is still widely misunderstood. More people are aware that they are suffering from treatable issues, more loved ones are encouraging earlier access to care, more attention is paid to the need for research, and more people are willing to donate to organizations that help raise mental health awareness. Individuals are unable to seek medical help because of stigma.

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Loved ones are not encouraging those who are suffering from mental health issues to seek help, instead of stigmatizing them as shameful. Many people still believe that mental illnesses are caused by poor choices and a lack of willpower to "snap out of it." This isn't correct! Take the time to explain mental health issues like eating disorders, anxiety, and depression to one's loved ones.

**Who invented pride month?** On November 2, 1969 it was invented by Craig Rodwell and his partners Fred Sargeant, Ellen Broidy, and Linda Rhodes who was the first to propose the first pride march, held in New York City.

**Facts You Didn't Know:**

**There was a "mother of pride" who was bisexual.** The mother of pride was a woman named Brenda Howard who was known for her work in organizing the Christopher Street Liberation

Day March. Howard was also credited with laying the foundation for the weeklong celebrations of Pride leading up the modern day Pride parades. She also cofounded the New York Bisexual Network in 1988.

**Pride Month has only been acknowledged by two U.S. presidents.** The first president to acknowledge pride was President Bill Clinton in 1999. And George W. Bush never issued a proclamation commemorating LGBT Pride. The other president that acknowledged pride was President Barack Obama declaring June Pride Month since 2009. Which lead Obama to saying "All people deserve to live with dignity and respect, free from fear and violence, and protected against discrimination, regardless of their gender identity or sexual orientation. During Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Pride Month, we celebrate the proud legacy LGBT individuals have woven into the fabric of our Nation, we honor those who have fought to perfect our Union, and we continue our work to build a society where every child grows up knowing that their country supports them, is proud of them, and has a place for them exactly as they are."

- **Violet** represents spirit


